## **OVERVIEW**

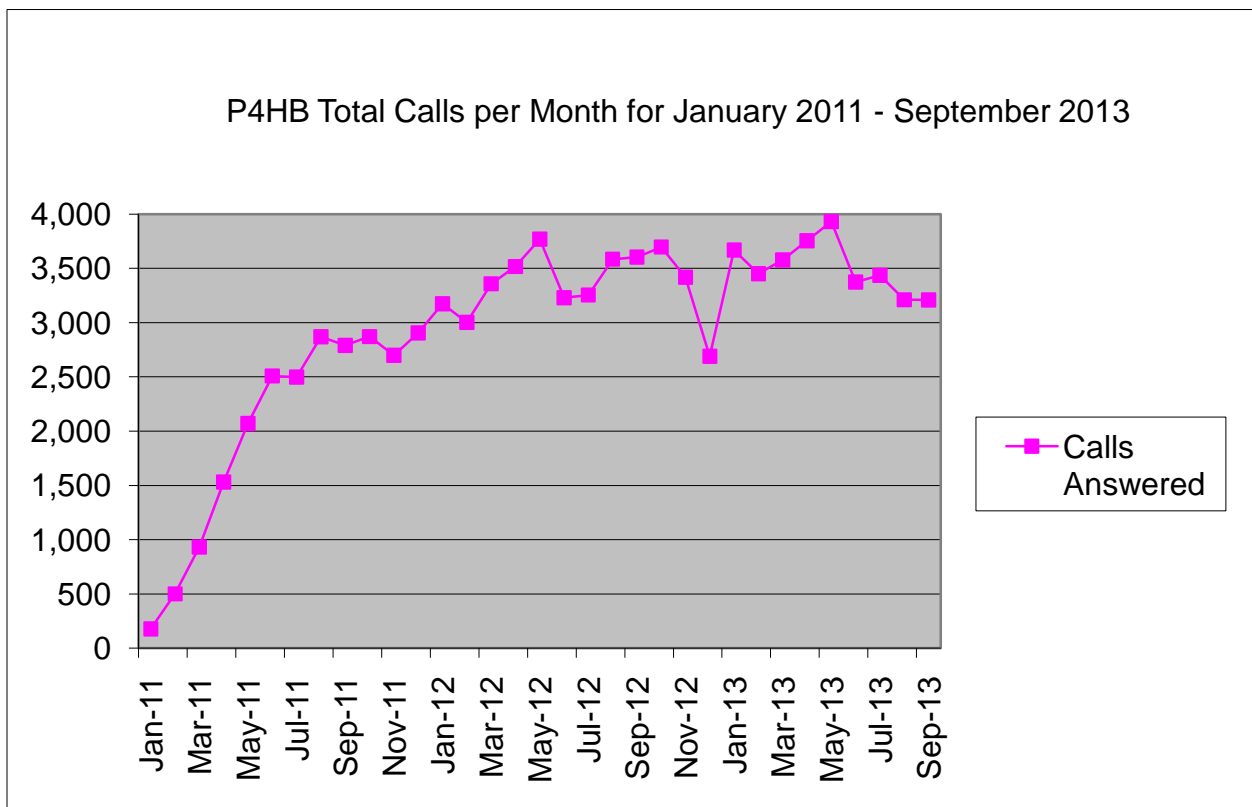
This third quarter report for Program Year 3 (PY 3) of Georgia's 1115 Demonstration, the Planning for Healthy Babies® (P4HB®) program, documents programmatic activities and performance related to outreach to potential participants, enrollment and disenrollment of participants, and utilization of services by the participants of the program. Throughout the third quarter of 2013 (Q3), while outreach activities increased awareness of the program by eligible community members, DCH saw a significant increase followed by a sharp decline in the number of women enrolled and subsequently participating in the program. This enrollment decline will be discussed further in this report.

As in past quarterly reports, P4HB programmatic information gleaned from the quarterly reports submitted by the Georgia Families Care Management Organizations (CMOs) is included in this report. Also included is a discussion of the CMOs' P4HB participants' survey results. These summary results compare the P4HB participants' knowledge, awareness, and utilization of P4HB covered services over time from surveys conducted in December 2011, April 2012, September 2012, and February 2013. Overall, findings suggest that participants enroll in P4HB to utilize family planning and primary care services.

## CALL VOLUME

PSI/MAXIMUS provided DCH with call volume data for the P4HB program and as shown in **Figure 1** below, answered call volume at the end of the Q3 was below the levels seen at the end of the second quarter of 2013. These results parallel the declines seen in enrollment for this quarter.

## ELIGIBILITY

Statistics obtained from the eligibility-related reports for this quarter are identified below.

- **Number of paper and electronic unique individual applications for the program by month.** (Source: PSI – P4HB Report 001, Run Date: 10/11/2013). The September 2013

program-to-date number of unique paper and web applications totaled 41,900.

- **Number of P4HB applicants including potential auto-enrolled members.** As of October 1, 2013, MAXIMUS reported a program-to-date total of 112,497 applicants for the P4HB program. This total is much higher than the total of paper and electronic applications received to date because it includes the unique individuals who submitted paper or electronic applications for the program plus former Medicaid and PeachCare for Kids<sup>®</sup> (Georgia's stand-alone CHIP program) members who were auto-enrolled into the P4HB program upon disenrollment from either of those programs. DCH discontinued auto-enrolling women into the family planning only component of the Demonstration in June 2013 because the data suggested these women did not have a strong ongoing interest in family planning only services. This was evidenced by their failure to complete the renewal process for the P4HB program. This is discussed further in the Renewal section of this report. DCH continues auto-enrolling women into the IPC component of P4HB because these women have demonstrated, through the completion of their renewal process, that they have more of a vested interest in continued participation in the IPC component of the Demonstration. DCH is aware that some of these women do eventually decline the IPC services, as described in the Interpregnancy Care section of this report, because they feel as though they have sufficient support structures in place to address concerns about their health or that of their very low birth weight (VLBW) infants.
- **Reasons why Demonstration applications were denied.** During Q3, the top two reasons cited for denial of applications for the P4HB program were non-response within 14 days and failure to verify income. Since the implementation of this program, DCH has identified a consistent pattern of women failing to complete the application process with

these two reasons being the most often reported. It is not clear why these women initiated the application process then failed to follow through. This pattern occurs primarily with applications for the family planning only component of P4HB.

- **Reasons why participants were terminated from the P4HB program.** For Q3, failure to complete the review was the dominant reason for termination from both the family planning and IPC components of P4HB. Anecdotal evidence shared by the CMOs revealed that women enrolled in the family planning only component of P4HB desire full health care benefits instead of family planning only services. Unfortunately, these women are not eligible for full Medicaid benefits in Georgia. Furthermore, many of them are eligible to receive family planning services through the Department of Public Health's Title X clinics and in that setting, they are not required to complete the same amount of paperwork as required for the P4HB program. It might be that from their perspective, it is easier to obtain contraception from the Title X clinics than to complete the eligibility process for Medicaid family planning services.
- **Average age of the women determined to be eligible for the P4HB program.** By the end of Q3, the average age of women deemed eligible for family planning services program-to-date was 23.1 years (comparable to the 22.98 years program-to-date reported in the second quarter of 2013). For women deemed eligible for IPC services, the average age program-to-date was 28.5 years.

**Table 1** below provides data on the full distribution of women deemed eligible, by age group, in September 2013 and illustrates that the majority (90.7%) of the women deemed eligible for the Family Planning and IPC components of the P4HB program in September

2013 were under the age of 36. Fifty-five percent of the eligible women were in the youngest age group, 18-22, consistent with the downward trend in the average age of those deemed eligible since program implementation. Of the total 22,108 in the 18 – 22 age group, only 86 were eighteen years of age.

- **Average monthly income of the women deemed eligible.** In order for a family with a non-working parent to be eligible for low income Medicaid (LIM) in Georgia, current criteria requires that their monthly income cannot exceed \$235 for a family of one (1); or \$500 for a family of four (4)<sup>1</sup>. Comparing LIM eligibility criteria to the 100% FPL levels,

a single non-pregnant woman is not eligible for Georgia's LIM program if her monthly income, on average, is greater than roughly 25% of the federal poverty level (FPL).

Eligibility for pregnant women in Georgia extends to 200% of FPL, which translates to \$1,916 in monthly income for a family of one and \$3,926 for a family of four. It would appear that these income criteria would encourage non-pregnant women to enroll in the P4HB program for at least this level of service and as documented by the next report, a significant number of women with incomes higher than 25% of the FPL have enrolled in the P4HB program.

- During Q3, the **Average Income Report** revealed that the average monthly household income for women enrolled in the family planning only component of P4HB ranged between \$1,213.08 and \$1216.97; and for the IPC component, it ranged between \$1402.48 and \$1530.14.
- **Average time from application to referral**. The number of days observed between the time of application and referral is discussed later in the Enrollment section of this report.
- **Top 5 County Enrollment**: As of the end of Q3 and as shown in **Table 2** below, just over one third (13,987/40,096) of the total number of women deemed eligible for the family planning only component of the P4HB program resided in the metro Atlanta counties of Fulton, DeKalb, Gwinnett, Cobb and Clayton. This is a continuing trend since implementation of this program.

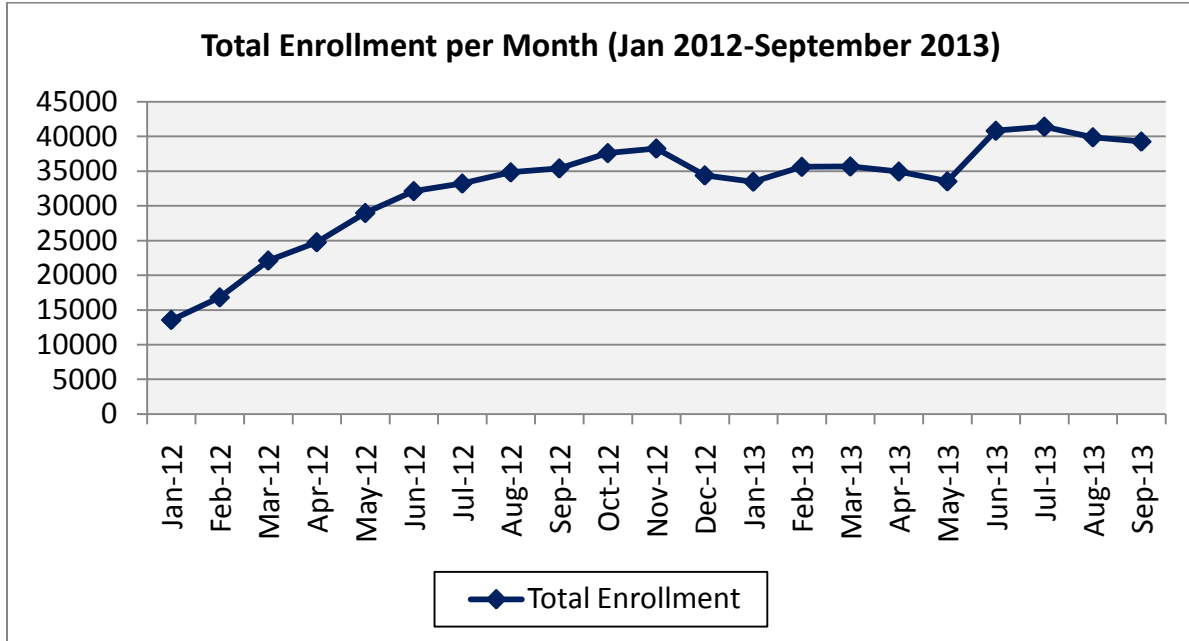

## **ENROLLMENT**

As of September 30, 2013, a total of 39,278 women were actually enrolled in one of the Georgia Families CMOs to receive P4HB services (see **Figure 2**). This number includes 39,024 women enrolled in the family planning only component, 104 women enrolled in the IPC component and 150 enrolled in Resource Mother only services. A 1.4% increase in enrollment was seen in July 2013 followed by a 3.7% drop in enrollment in August 2013 and an additional 1.5% decrease in enrollment in September 2013. These changes represent an overall 3.8% decrease in CMO enrollment of P4HB participants since the end of the second quarter of 2013. There was also a decrease in the number of IPC women (from 117 to 104, an 11.1% decline) enrolled in a CMO during Q3 compared to the second quarter of 2013.

The Q3 time from the receipt of the application for P4HB to referral to an RSM worker was similar to the result from the third quarter of 2012 (11.4 days in September 2012 and 11.3 days in September 2013). There has been a slight increase over the past year in the average number of days from the RSM request for more information to a PSI response, from 4.5 days in September 2012 to 6.4 days by the end of September 2013. Despite this slight increase, 6.4 days is still considerably lower than the high of 9.8 days recorded for November 2012. It does not appear this is a factor deterring enrollment into the program. By the end of this quarter, the average time from renewal to referral to the RSM worker was 26 days, the same average time as in September 2012.

## **RENEWALS**

As described in previous quarterly reports, for the annual eligibility redeterminations for the P4HB program, letters are sent to enrolled participants two months prior to their renewal date. Participants must resubmit their income documentation and comply with any additional requests for information in order to remain enrolled in the P4HB program beyond their renewal date. During Q3, a total of 9,128 renewal letters were sent to eligible P4HB participants. All but 70 of these participants were enrolled in the family planning component of the program.

Unfortunately, only 1,259, or 13.8%, of these eligible P4HB participants completed their renewal applications (Source: P4HB<sup>®</sup> Renewal Reports RP003 for July, August and September 2013). We understand from our member services team that a large number of the women who were not renewed had been auto-enrolled into the program during the previous year. As stated earlier in this report, the auto-enrollment process for the family planning only component has ended. The CMOs continue their interventions to encourage renewals and dissuade disenrollment from the program, including distributing postcards and conducting automated renewal phone calls to remind participants of the renewal/recertification process.

## **CMO REPORTS and UTILIZATION OF SERVICES**

The following utilization information was made available through the Q3 P4HB reports prepared by the Georgia Families CMOs. Sources of data in this section of the report include the monthly MMIS report MGD-3823-M, the MCHB Enrollment after EOM Processing report, and the Family Planning/Resource Mother Quarterly CMO Reports. **Table 3** summarizes the main findings for each CMO regarding participant service utilization in Q3.

## **INTERPREGNANCY CARE**

### **Amerigroup**

Amerigroup reported they served a total of 126 IPC/RM participants at some point during the third quarter of 2013 (34 less than during the second quarter of 2013). Of those:

- 19% were active participants (24 participants). Of these, 23 participants (95%) had a known method of contraception. Resource Mothers actively engaged participants to obtain this information and assist participants with scheduling gynecology appointments.
- 30% (38 participants) declined program participation. The main reason for declining the program was that participants believed they did not need the services because they had adequate family support and other resources available to them. (It was not clear to DCH from this comment whether these women had been auto-enrolled into the P4HB IPC program or whether they self initiated enrollment then later determined the IPC services were not needed.)
- 19% (24 participants) no longer met eligibility requirements.
- 32% (40 participants) were unable to be contacted.

In Q3, Amerigroup reported 25 home visits to the IPC participants' most recent known address in an attempt to conduct case management activities with these participants.. The number of these home visits decreased by more than half from the second quarter of 2013, when a total of 63 home visits were made.

### **Peach State Health Plan (Peach State)**

Peach State reported that 24 out of their 56 participants receiving IPC benefits were using some form of contraception during Q3. Women enrolled in their IPC and Resource Mothers only components of P4HB were included in Peach State's continued outreach and education efforts, including the enhanced strategies to encourage each participant's reporting of their contraceptive use.

### **WellCare**

WellCare reported that during Q3, 22 IPC participants were terminated from their program for the following reasons: twenty-one (21) lost eligibility and one (1) did not meet program criteria. Also during Q3, Wellcare conducted 35 face-to-face IPC visits, a decrease from the 46 face-to-face visits conducted during the second quarter of 2013.

### **P4HB OUTREACH ACTIVITIES**

As mentioned in the overview and above, extensive client and provider outreach regarding the P4HB program was conducted by the CMOs and by the RSM workers during Q3. The RSM workers made 459 presentations in 83 counties about the P4HB program to interested individuals in communities throughout the state. P4HB client outreach activities conducted by the RSM workers occurred at a variety of events including health fairs, job fairs, community and school meetings, church meetings, and through visits to youth development centers. In this outreach process, RSM workers conducted one-on-one presentations as well as large-scale group information sessions. Attendance at most outreach activities was quite high as exemplified by: in July 2013, RSM workers promoted P4HB to over 2,500 individuals in Henry County at the

Henry County Parent Expo; in August 2013, RSM workers promoted P4HB to 4,000 individuals in Clayton County at the Chick Fil A Back to School Bash; and in September 2013, RSM workers promoted P4HB to over 1,000 people in Fulton County at the Greenbrier Mall. A listing of the outreach activities conducted by the RSM Outreach Project staff can be found in **Appendix A.**

## **CMO MEMBER SURVEY RESULTS**

The CMOs, in collaboration with the DCH, monitor member and provider overall knowledge and understanding of the P4HB program twice yearly through an analysis of member and provider surveys. Analyses of these surveys serve to help the CMOs and DCH better understand and improve member and provider experiences with the P4HB program. The survey results also provide important process and outcomes data about the impact of the P4HB program.

To date, four (4) waves of member and provider surveys have been administered -- in December 2011, April 2012, September 2012, and February 2013. Each of the CMOs administered the first two waves of the surveys to their members and providers. The CMOs then engaged The Myers Group to administer the third and fourth waves of the surveys. The fifth wave of the surveys was completed in September 2013. For purposes of this Q3 report, we include select results from the P4HB member surveys. These results address the following topics: 1) enrollment and utilization of P4HB services; 2) member knowledge about the P4HB program; and 3) problems encountered by members enrolled in the P4HB program. We plan to report the full member and provider survey results from the first three survey waves in our second Annual Report.

## **Survey Methods**

**First Wave of Member Surveys:** The first wave of member surveys was completed near the end of Year 1. The CMOs distributed surveys to their P4HB participants from December 2011 to January 2012. All participants identified by the CMOs as being enrolled in the P4HB program during the period of February 2011 through August 2011 (3,202 participants) were mailed a survey. Only 5.3% of these participants actually responded to the survey.

**Second Wave of Member Surveys:** The second wave of member surveys was distributed four months into Year 2. The CMOs distributed surveys to their P4HB participants from April 2012 to May 2012. All participants identified by the CMOs as being enrolled in the P4HB program during the period of September 2011 through February 2012 (11,053 participants) were mailed a survey. Only 3.6% of these participants actually responded to the survey.

**Third Wave of Surveys:** The third wave of member surveys was distributed nine months into Year 2. The Myers Group used contact information for P4HB participants to distribute surveys to the CMOs' P4HB participants from September 2012 to October 2012. All participants identified by the CMOs as being enrolled in the P4HB program during the period of April 2012 through July 2012 (9,000 participants) were mailed a survey. Only 12.8% of these participants actually responded to the survey.

**Fourth Wave of Surveys:** The fourth wave of member surveys was distributed four months into Year 3. The Myers Group used contact information for participants to distribute surveys to the CMOs' P4HB participants in February 2013. A total of 8,852 participants were identified by



the CMOs as being eligible to participate in this wave of the member surveys. Only 10.3% of these participants actually responded to the survey.

The overall low response rates may reflect that no incentives were provided to the members for survey participation.

### **CMO Member Survey Results for Survey Waves 1 through 4**

The following tables summarize the survey findings regarding the P4HB program, as reported by the P4HB participants responding to the member survey. Major findings are highlighted in each table below.

#### **Enrollment and Utilization (Table 4)**

- A substantial number of participants report enrolling in P4HB to receive primary care services, such as routine check-ups and care for illnesses, in addition to birth control or family planning services. DCH comment - The family planning only component of the P4HB program does not cover general care for illnesses. P4HB providers are to refer P4HB family planning only participants to other providers who will serve as the participant's primary care medical home.
- Across the four waves, 72%, 57%, 47%, and 43% respectively of the respondents said 'yes' to birth control or family planning as the reason for enrollment while 80%, 68%, 54%, and 49% respectively said 'yes' to enrolling for primary care (such as check-ups or physicals). DCH comment - While it appears that participants' have a better understanding that the purpose of the P4HB program is not to deliver general primary care, it is very concerning that birth control and family planning services are declining as the reasons for enrollment into the P4HB program.
- In each survey wave, between 38 - 49% of those responding said they had used P4HB to obtain birth control/family planning services while 33% - 54% reported they had used primary care services through the program. DCH comment – Although routine primary care services are not available through the P4HB program, the program does cover an annual examination and follow up for STCs identified during that examination. From this perspective, survey respondents may have equated these services with primary care services.
- Survey participants indicated that family planning and primary care services were

difficult to access prior to their enrollment in the P4HB program and in turn, this access was identified as the largest change for them resulting from enrollment in the P4HB program. 83% of respondents in the first wave reported they were now able to get preventive care (such as Pap smears) and family planning counseling. 50% of respondents in the fourth wave also reported this change. We note that this percentage declined over the four waves. Since we do not know whether some of the same women are represented in subsequent waves of the survey, it is hard to assess the meaning of this decline.

- Across the four waves of the survey, a substantial proportion of the women reported being able to start using a birth control method - 49% in the first wave down to 28% in the fourth wave. Again, it is difficult to interpret the declines from the first to the fourth wave.

### **Knowledge of Members about P4HB (Table 5)**

- Substantial percentages of enrolled members understood the eligibility criteria for the family planning only ('pink' card) component of P4HB (see Eligibility for 'Pink Card' in Table 5). The percentage responding correctly to the range of eligibility criteria for the family planning component of the P4HB program showed a decline over time, ranging from 92% to 55% in wave 1 to 44% to 31% to 18% in wave 4.
- Correct responses for eligibility for the IPC component of P4HB were 26% or less for all items in all four waves of the survey (see Eligibility for 'Purple Card' in Table 5). This perhaps reflects that all women were asked these questions rather than following the skip pattern in the survey so as to ask women in each program component the questions specific to her component (e.g. FP, IPC, or Resource Mother).
- General declines were observed across the four waves of the survey in the responses regarding the services covered under specific components of P4HB. In wave 1, approximately 70% of respondents understood that birth control services and methods as well as Pap tests and pelvic exams were covered whereas only 32% understood this in the fourth survey wave. From 52% to 26% (wave 1 and wave 4 respectively) of survey respondents recognized that STD testing was provided under the 'Pink Card' with the lowest response being in the fourth survey wave. However, far smaller percentages were aware of some of the other services available under the program. For example, only 26% in wave 1 dropping to a low of 11% in wave 4 of survey respondents reported being aware of coverage for vitamins with folic acid. There is very little understanding of the coverage afforded under the "Purple Card", which also may be due to women not following the intended 'skip' pattern in the survey.

### **Problems Encountered by Members Enrolled in P4HB (Table 6):**

The three most prevalent problems experienced by participants in the P4HB program were:

- not getting the family planning services that were needed. Here, the lowest percentage is in the fourth survey wave, indicating fewer problems in obtaining needed services.
- not getting the referrals or follow up they needed. As there was not a follow-up 'probe' question in the survey that enabled members to describe the services that they felt were lacking, we do not have further information on this point.
- not being able to find a doctor or nurse willing to take P4HB clients.

There were declines in the percentages of women reporting these barriers over the four waves of the survey suggesting some improvement in accessing needed services following enrollment in the P4HB program.

## **Evaluation Activities**

Emory University, the P4HB program evaluator, reported the following evaluation activities that were underway during Q3:

- 1) analysis of the 2009-2012 counts of deliveries and infants based on ICD-9 rather than DRG codes;
- 2) analysis of the 2009-2011 claims and administrative data linked to the vital records and the resulting birth weight distributions among Medicaid paid births;
- 3) creation of analytic files for the 'pre' and 'post' years of 2009-2012 for analysis of time to next pregnancy/delivery for RSM women;
- 4) creation of analytic files to identify pregnancies/deliveries (and birth outcomes) among women participating in the family planning only and IPC components of P4HB;
- 5) creation of an analytic file for 2009-2012 to measure use of family planning services pre/post P4HB implementation among Medicaid enrolled women and use of family

planning services among women in the 25% to 200% FPL income strata through either Title X or Medicaid funding;

- 6) final multivariate analysis of Title X visit data through the first quarter of 2013 on changes in insured status of Title X clients, changes in use of more versus less effective birth control and testing of significance in the changes among women eligible for P4HB versus those not eligible.

During Q3, DCH and Emory University discussed a summary of the 2009 and 2010 data. As the updated 2011 and new 2012 claims extracts for the P4HB program were delivered to Emory, the evaluators realized that DRG coding for deliveries and newborns was markedly less complete than in prior years. It was evident that the DRG coding was missing from some of the CMOs' encounters submitted to DCH. Since the DRGs had been used to identify newborns and categorize them by birth weight in the past, the CMOs were asked to complete these missing fields for the set of infants identified as born in these years. Upon receipt of the requested information, it was evident that the DRG fields were still missing on a substantial number of the encounters. Given that these files were still incomplete and that ICD-9 coding could be used in place of the DRGs, Emory conducted comparisons of counts of infants/deliveries and birth weight distributions using ICD-9 versus DRG codes. Using the linked 2009-2011 claims and vital records, Emory concluded that the agreement between claims and vital records was similar for ICD-9 and DRG coding but that, using either coding system, the claims data consistently resulted in: 1) a smaller percentage of infants categorized as low birth weight; and 2) within those categorized as low birth weight, a larger percentage of very low birth weights was seen when compared with the very low birth weight percentages reported in the vital records for the



same set of infants. The latter pattern reflects, in part, that Emory assigned the lowest birth weight category when more than one was observed in the claims data. When this rule was changed, the percent very low birth weight was understated relative to that observed in vital records. Emory will continue to use the assignment of the lowest birth weight observed in the claims data since, from a scientific viewpoint, it is a more conservative approach. If Emory does see an effect using this method, they will be more confident it is a real/true effect. Ultimately, Emory will use the vital records data as the ‘gold standard’ for measuring birth weight once they are available and linked.

As noted in our last quarterly report, in addition to updating the Year 1 report, the evaluation team plans to include the following types of analysis in the Year 2 report to discern if there is any evidence of early effects of the Demonstration:

1. Combine the 2009-2012 claims with the Title X data for the same period, omitting those which say Medicaid paid in Title X, to see if the number of family planning visits per uninsured woman in the targeted income range in Georgia has increased over the pre/post demonstration period.
2. Use this combined family planning visit file to analyze whether the use of the more effective contraceptives has increased among women in the targeted income range (> 50% but < 200% FPL) who are using family planning services.
3. Measure the number and percentage of family planning only enrollees who become pregnant while enrolled in the demonstration and among them, how many deliver on Medicaid.

4. Compare the birth outcomes of the women participating in the demonstration to other Medicaid RSM women who did not. The evaluation team will have data through 2012 but will have to measure outcomes based on claims data alone since the link to vital records will not yet be available. The evaluation team will discuss the caveats noted above.
5. Measure the percentage of RSM women with an index delivery/birth paid by Medicaid who have a delivery/birth within the next 6 months and in turn, next 12 months paid by Medicaid. The evaluation team will be able to follow women with index births under RSM in 2009, 2010, and 2011 and in the first six months of 2012 for six months with complete claims. They can follow women with index deliveries/births in 2009 through June of 2012 for a 12 month follow-up period ending in June of 2013, knowing deliveries will likely be understated for this period.

The evaluation team will also report further on the provider surveys regarding any improvements in their understanding of the P4HB program over the first two years of its implementation. All of these analyses will be used to inform DCH's application for a formal extension of the P4HB program.

## **ACTION PLANS**

1. **Outreach to Neonatal Intensive Care Unit (NICU) Staff:** Emory University's Global Collaborating Center on Reproductive Health, located in Atlanta, Georgia, began offering a webinar in April 2013 to Georgia hospitals' NICU staff to promote their engagement to assist women in enrolling in the Interpregnancy Care component of the Demonstration. E-mail

invitations were sent to NICU medical directors, nurse coordinators, and social workers prior to each planned webinar. To date, one webinar was delivered in April 2013 (attended by staff from three NICU sites) and another in May 2013 (attended by staff from five NICU sites). Additional dates for the webinar are being planned for the fall of 2013. The webinar lasts approximately 35 minutes and addresses three learning objectives: (1) To convey the goals and objectives, eligibility criteria, and services covered by the P4HB program (the Family Planning only and the Interpregnancy Care components); (2) To promote understanding of the need for improving women's underlying health status as a strategy for improving Georgia's fetal-infant mortality; and (3) To convey how NICU providers can assist women to enroll in the P4HB program, with a focus on the Interpregnancy Care component. After the didactic presentation, the webinar ends with practical advice from a NICU social worker who has been a champion in enrolling women into the P4HB program followed by an open question and answer session for the webinar participants.

2. **Completion of the second Annual Report for P4HB:** The evaluation team is in the process of preparing the second Annual Report.
3. **Maintain ongoing communication with family planning and OB/GYN providers:** Communication with family planning and OB/GYN providers to inform them about P4HB will continue throughout the life of the Demonstration.
4. **Ongoing engagement of providers involved in High Risk Pregnancies:** Our CMOs continually outreach to their network providers who provide care for these high risk pregnant women.
5. **Ongoing engagement of Georgia's Title X Family Planning Program:** Georgia's Title X Family Planning Program has been sharing data on a quarterly basis with the P4HB

evaluation team at Emory. This data is used to update the evaluator's file and complete descriptive and multivariate analyses.

**6. Ongoing collaborations with the Georgia Department of Public Health (DPH) and the Georgia Department of Human Services Division of Family and Children Services**

**(DFCS):** These collaborations aim to further outreach to teens and young women who are uninsured and either paying out of pocket for family planning services/supplies or going without needed services. Our partnerships help us reach women in the local public health clinics and the DFCS offices. Some of these efforts are reflected in the local meetings held by RSM workers across the state.

**7. P4HB member and provider surveys:** We have reported the results from the first four waves of the member surveys in this Q3 report. We will present the provider results from the first four waves in the upcoming second Annual P4HB Report. The CMOs distributed a fifth round of P4HB provider and member surveys in August and September 2013. These results will be analyzed and reported in a forthcoming quarterly report.

## **EXPENDITURES**

As the number of women enrolled in the P4HB program has grown over time, the total federal and state dollars spent on all components of the P4HB program have increased accordingly. The total spent on per member per month (capitation) payments to the Georgia Families CMOs made by DCH during Q3 was \$5.1 million, up 10.9% from the total of \$4.6 million spent in the second quarter of 2013. This was due to the spike in enrollment in July 2013 but as noted earlier in this report, enrollment has declined since that spike. As shown in past quarters, the great majority of capitation payments were for those women enrolled in family planning only benefits in P4HB. A full 98% of the total Q3 capitation payments were for women enrolled in the family planning

only component and these payments totaled \$5.0 million. The increase in total payments parallels the increase in member months for this group, from 108,251 in quarter 2 of 2013 to 119,846 in Q3.

A total of \$68,400 in capitation payments was made to the CMOs in Q3 for the women enrolled in the IPC component of P4HB, down 23.6% from the \$89,520 paid during the second quarter of 2013. This decline in capitation payments from quarter two to Q3 reflects a decline of 11.1% in the number of IPC women enrolled in a CMO this quarter compared to last quarter and in turn, a 23% decline in their member months. In addition, as shown in the Budget Neutrality Worksheet below, there was a drop in member months from 373 to 295 for this group. We continue to exclude from these totals the costs for the low-income or disabled women receiving Resource Mothers/Case Management only services since their costs cannot be combined with that of the women enrolled in the IPC component of the P4HB program. The Budget Neutrality Worksheet for Q3 follows.

We note that the P4HB program now has enough of a follow-up period that the first year infant costs for those born in 2012 can be estimated by birth weight and included in the second section of the budget neutrality worksheet. DCH will update the budget neutrality worksheet with the first year of life infant costs for infants born in 2012 in the fourth quarter report that will be submitted in February 2014. Costs of VLBW infants born to women in the IPC component (if any) could also be estimated at the time of their birth. Since these calculations rely on the analysis being done for the Year 2 Annual Report, DCH will also include those costs in the second Annual Report for the P4HB program that will be submitted no later than December 31, 2013.
